





Lake Chabot Regional Park. Then and now...

Lake Chabot was built by Anthony Chabot, the "Water King," in the early 1870s at the same time his company was building Lake Temescal. Lake Chabot was built as a primary water source for the East Bay and was closed to recreation for 91 years. Today it is regularly stocked with trout and catfish, and boating is as popular as it was when the lake opened for recreational uses in the 1960s (inset). The annual spring fishing derby is a popular event, and the park offers more than 20 miles of hiking trails, which connect to an additional 70 miles in the adjoining Anthony Chabot Regional Park and family campground.

Tilden Historic Carousel. Then and now....

Each year 150,000 visitors enjoy the 1911, National Register-listed Hershell-Spillman "Menagerie Edition" Carousel, one of only two still operating in the U.S. Since its arrival in Tilden Regional Park in 1948, the carousel has delighted visitors with its 59 hand-carved and hand-painted animals. The East Bay Regional Park District operated a second carousel from 1953 to the mid 1960s, the smaller version (inset) entertaining young and old alike at Roberts Regional Recreation Area in Oakland.








Redwood Regional Park. Then and now...

The East Bay Regional Park District held its official opening ceremonies at Redwood Regional Park's Redwood Bowl on Oct. 18, 1936. Hundreds of citizens enjoyed the festivities, which included appearances by the University of California Marching Band, the Cal Glee Club and Treble Clef Society, high school bands, an R.O.T.C. battalion, and numerous equestrian groups. Redwood Bowl today (inset) is a verdant, peaceful oasis set amidst Oakland's busy metropolitan area.

Neptune Beach/Crown Memorial State Beach. Then and now...

Neptune Beach (above and below), as it was called from 1917 to 1939, had been a resort since the 1880s. The amusement area, known as the "Coney Island of the West," had a public beach, two large swimming pools, an 8,000-seat stadium, a ballroom, and carnival rides like the "Whoopee" roller coaster. The popular Alameda Island swimming beach today (inset), at 2.5 miles the longest stretch of sandy beach on San Francisco Bay, is flanked by the Crab Cove Marine Conservation Area and visitor center on the northern cove, and the Elsie Roemer Bird Sanctuary along the southern shoreline.




Black Diamond Mines Regional Preserve. Then and now...

Rose Hill Cemetery, a popular hiking destination today, was a protestant burial ground for the five nineteenthcentury coal mining communities that comprise today's Black Diamond Mines Regional Preserve in Antioch. The historic cemetery serves as a monument to the men, women, and children who died in the harsh living and mining conditions of the era. Park District Naturalist Carleen Bruins (inset) described the cemetery's history to schoolchildren circa 1975 just as educational programs today utilize the cemetery and the park's underground visitor center to interpret the park's coal- and sand-mining past.

Morgan Territory Regional Preserve. Then and now...

Relics of Morgan Territory Regional Preserve's ranching past are evident throughout the eastern Contra Costa County preserve. Morgan Territory is named for Jeremiah Morgan, born in Alabama in 1818. Morgan became a Forty-Niner in 1849 when he emigrated to California and briefly mined for gold. He left California for Iowa but returned with his family in 1853. In 1857 he started a ranch in the area that today bears his name after having seen the land while on a hunting expedition. The Cleese family (inset and below) was photographed in today's Morgan Territory sometime near the turn of the century.



Point Pinole Regional Shoreline. Then and now...

Above: Giant Powder Company workers pose at the company's Point Pinole location circa 1898. Giant Powder produced dynamite at this bayside location, and by 1916 Point Pinole had become an industrial center and company town with a railroad station, school, and living quarters for workers. Point Pinole Regional Shoreline today (inset) is a favorite for fishing and hiking. Park visitors can get a glimpse into the park's explosive past in a few remaining relics scattered about the parkland.



Martin Luther King Jr. Regional Shoreline, with over six miles of flat, paved trails, has always been a serene and kid-friendly place for bicycling. The park's trails embrace the 50-acre Arrowhead Marsh–a stop on the Pacific Flyway and Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network– making it an ideal and often-used locale for birdwatchers.

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Martinez Regional Shoreline. Then and now...

The wheat ship Forester lies offshore circa 1930s-40s, exactly where the schooner's hull lies today off Martinez Regional Shoreline. Granger's Wharf, the Martinez Wharf, and the Shell Oil pier and storage tanks are visible in the background. The old Benicia Bridge, railroad only at that time, was expanded in the 1960s to carry automobiles. Today, the Martinez pier and marina and the California Delta can be seen from the shoreline park's higher elevations (inset).

Coyote Hills Regional Park. Then and now...

The Bayview Trail, winding around Coyote Hills Regional Park's South Marsh, offers bayside views for hikers, bicyclists, birdwatchers, and nature lovers of all varieties. The Fremont park's varied history ranges from a 2,000-year-old Tuibun Ohlone shellmound site to the remnants of a 1960s NIKE missile site (inset). The park's visitor center specializes in portrayals of Ohlone life, including display of a park staff-constructed tule reed boat made according to Native American methods.

Ardenwood Historic Farm. Some things never change...

Ardenwood Historic Farm's mission is to keep the past alive as a working nineteenthcentury, Victorian-era farm. The Patterson Estate was established by George Patterson, a Forty-Niner who made it rich not in the gold fields but in the rich soil of southern Alameda County. Today, the restored Victorian mansion, gardens, and working historic farm showcase the lifestyle and agricultural practices of the 1870s, complete with an operating horsedrawn train that offers tours of the 200-acre farm.
