Trees link us with everything! Trees purify our air, produce the oxygen we breathe, increase soil fertility, regulate our climate, aid in erosion control, and are an important wildlife habitat. Oak woodlands harbor one of the most biologically diverse habitats in California. They are home to over 170 species of birds, 100 mammals, 60 amphibians and reptiles, and 4,000 species of insects. The trees planted here are part of a habitat transformation project that scrub jays started! By "planting" acorns into crevices or holes in the ground, the jays store food for the future. Some acorns are retrieved and eaten; others may later germinate. Taking a lesson from the birds and guided by a motive of generosity, people planted this grove of trees to create a lasting legacy for future generations.
