

Measure WW Highlights

Over 67 current and future EBRPD parks, open space, trails, and shoreline projects will benefit from Measure WW. Some of the high priority projects include:

- Acquiring and restoring urban creeks.
- Expanding and developing the Bay Trail, East Bay Greenway Trail, Delta Trail, and Ridge Trail.
- Renovating Eastshore State Park.
- Creating a new Regional Park at the Concord Naval Weapons Station.
- Increasing access at Briones, Sunol, and Pleasanton Ridge.
- Developing the Oakland and North Richmond shorelines.
- Acquiring sensitive property at Doolan Canyon.
- Completing the Tidewater Recreation Area at Martin Luther King Jr. Regional Shoreline.

Alameda Creek. Funds from Measure WW would help to protect and restore many miles of sensitive creeks struggling to survive in an urban setting. Creeks are critical habitat to many species and an important indicator of the health of our environment.



Redwood Regional Park. Trees, plants, and grasslands naturally reduce carbon dioxide in the air and help fight global warming, creating a better place for us and future generations to live.
