Brian W. Holt: 2016 Recipient of the Friends of Port Chicago Commemorative Hero's Award



Brian W. Holt is a Principal Planner with the East Bay Regional Park District and leads the Advance Planning unit for the agency. His position focuses on working with project developers, governmental agencies, and stakeholders to protect and expand the public open space network throughout the East Bay.

For the past 11 years, he has led the reuse planning for over 2,500 acres of

the former Concord Naval Weapons Station that will become a new regional park in Concord, CA, including the development of a future visitor center for the Port Chicago Naval Magazine National Memorial.

Brian has degrees in natural resource planning and management from Humboldt State University and Duke University's Nicholas School of the Environment. He previously served as president of the San Francisco Bay Area chapter of the Association of Environmental Professionals and currently chairs the Park and Recreation Commission for the City of Half Moon Bay.

A portion of the Port Chicago Naval Magazine was dedicated as a National Memorial in 1994. In October 2009, the National Memorial became the 392nd unit of the National Park System.
